A TRIBUTE TO CARAT by Joy Loyla

An unassuming hack in the sunshine on 21st September r esulted in what turned out to be irreparable injuries from a collision with a car and my beautiful Spanish boy was pts on 9th October.

During the time we had together he never had a single day of lameness or sickness. Four years of hard graft and training resulted in a true partnership, learning together. He turned an old endurance rider into a show rider - he wasn't easy but when the stars aligned he was magical.

We packed more into our 4 years together than most people would do in a

lifetime. His flying changes, canter pirouettes, piaffe and passage were getting stronger and cleaner with every outing and training sessions were a delight. Our hopes of also developing his love of jumping next season will now sadly never be realised. We shared some amazing experiences in the showring and on parades

Our win at this year's Royal Windsor Horse Show was confirmation that my decision to purchase a PRE from Spain purely from a photo and videos was a gamble that would pay off.

We competed at local and County level shows, all the Foreign Breed classes, Concours d'elegance, side-saddle, and the honour of representing the PRE at Cranleigh's Foreign Breed Showcase & twice riding in London New Year's Day Parade.



He gave me an outlet for my love of making costumes and happily became 'Carat the Clothes Horse' He trusted me whatever and wherever

we ventured together.



Carat was quite a character ~ his presence at the club clinics were always eventful but goodness me, I miss them and joining all the friendly riders. However, that group hack on 15th September at Godmersham in stunning soundings and amongst all the horses and riders will always be my favourite memory of the best time together. Carol Gillatt: The Brave Coward

I returned to riding in 2020 after more than 40 years of virtually no contact with horses. I started with a loan of a 'plodder' who turned out to be missing his mum....word to the wise – never loan a Haflinger!

It quickly became obvious that our relationship wasn't going to work out and that finding a loan horse wasn't that easy, so I jumped in feet first and bought my first horse.

I purchased Clara in March 2021, largely because I felt sorry for her, and also because she was a 'nice person' – they are absolutely rubbish reasons for buying your first horse at the age of 60, but live and learn! I had been looking for a bay gelding, bit of a school master and a max of 15.2hh, but they proved to be hard to find. I ended up with a grey, 16.1hh, mare who most certainly is



not a school mistress; however, we are now united in our love for each other....although I swear her love isn't as deep as mine at times!

It soon became apparent that I no longer had the same level of confidence that I had back in the day and my riding skills had obviously deteriorated. In the first year I fell off more times than I care to remember (I am so grateful for the

invention of body protectors), and I became quite fearful. This really didn't help Clara who was looking to me for confidence.

In 2022, I started to take lessons with Denize King and she has been so patient with me. Not having an indoor or outdoor school makes it impossible to continue schooling through the winter months but as soon as the ground dries, out the lessons restart and slowly but surely, DK has got me to a stage where I feel as though I am a proper rider again....well as long as long as there are no jumps in our path!



Dec 2023 I attended my first pole clinic and Clara decided that it was rather over whelming whilst we were waiting to go into the school.....all I wanted to do was get off and go home, but with encouragement we eventually got in the school and I survived the lesson. She was actually really good once we got going. I chuckled to myself when at the end, the trainer said she could see that Clara was really trying to look after me. It certainly didn't feel like that when we were waiting to go in, but now looking back I can appreciate what she was saying.

After the pole clinic and after seeing lots of FDRC clinics being advertised, I decided I was going to become a FDRC member in 2024 and see where it took me. I knew I needed to

'force' myself out of my comfort zone but I was so sceptical and nervous about it because I didn't know anybody at the club and assumed everybody would be super confident riders. I soon found out that isn't always the case and most of all everybody has been very supportive, friendly and genuinely wanting you to do well.

In my first year I have attended a 2-Day Camp at Ann Berry's, a Katy Ford 50-60 jump clinic, been on a day-trip to Newmarket, had a walk round Bigberry (no horse) to see what it's all about, and I'm booked for the FDRC quiz night and Christmas meal.

The Ann Berry camp was simply just great! I spent the first day being totally scared but by the end of day two, I was wishing it was a 3-day camp. I made some lovely new friends and so did Clara, who seemed totally at home in her holiday camp, but most of all I learnt a lot about my partnership with Clara. She really did try her best to look after me.

The Katy Ford jump clinic was the first time I had jumped a course since 1978, so for a natural coward, it was a massive achievement to get round the 50-60, even though Clara could easily do 60-70 or 70-80. I found Katy to be an excellent trainer as she made me feel at ease with what I was meant to be doing – simple instructions and lots of praise. Unfortunately, due to road closures during the summer, I had to cancel my next clinic with her, but I hope to book more in 2025.



The Newmarket Trip was such a fun and memorable day out. It was a real opportunity to get to know some faces and to see what goes on in the world of racing both on and off the track. I'm hoping there is another one next year.

So what has the first year of Faversham District Riding Club done for a nervous and cowardly, yet determined older rider? Well, from my perspective it has helped give me a focus and a sense of belonging. It has also made me realise that I'm not on my own, that there are others out there in the same situation as myself who are experiencing the same emotions. Along with my regular lessons and the club events I have attended, I can feel that my confidence has increased and in turn, my relationship with Clara has deepened further.

I'm looking forward to 2025. Yes I will still be nervous when I turn up for an event, but the more I do it, the less intense those nerves will be. I am so glad that I made the decision to join Faversham District Riding Club in 2024 and here's to 2025 and whatever I can achieve.



SUMMER CT NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS at ASTON-Le-WALLS on October 5th & 6th Report by Desti Horton



SPARKLY QUINN

I was thrilled to find I had secured myself a place at the finals, although somewhat shocked too. I have only a vague memory of my 2nd place qualifier at Felbridge back in May! Our preparation concentrated wholly on our weaker discipline - dressage.

We had weekly lessons working on rhythm and balance that we increased to twice weekly, a couple of weeks before the event. The day before we left, we washed Quin and put her in her onesie to keep her sparkly. Cleaned the tack and prepped all the gear.

One of my oldest friends, Inca, had promised she would come with me, and even though she is not horsey, she was

an amazingly help! We packed up the horsebox with everything, including a kitchen sink! Combined training requires quite a lot of different tack, horse equipment, clothes, boots, and plenty of accessories, so my accurate and endlessly long list was a torn mess in the end.

We left home (me, Inca, and of course, my chauffeur and best supporter - Mum) at 1pm and arrived in Aston-Le-Walls about 4 hours later. Quin was quiet and content, during the journey, with her travel boots keeping her legs snug, while munching hay in-between snoozing. We could see her the whole journey in the camera. We scored a (not too disgraceful) 37.1%, which meant if I was to stay in the running, I would need to go clear in the showjumping.

As soon as Quin saw the jumps she pricked up her ears and said to me "Here we are Mum, this is what I came for; Ive got

this!" And she did. Double clear my little star. We had quite a



wait to collect my 8th place rosette and then a long drive home. But I loved every moment of it and just wish Quinney was ten years younger so I could have another decade riding her!
